# Pronoun Words and Pronoun Additions / Affixes Ktunaxa English Description

#### Forms used to **Show a Subject**:

"Hu" is used when the next word begins with a consonant. "Hun" is used when the next word begins with a vowel or glottal stop.

<u>Please Note:</u> some speakers put the "n" at the beginning of the verb root instead of attaching it to "hu".

Hu/Hin = I/You

#### **Examples:**

<u>**Hu**</u> skiki‡ ?itkini kiki‡ = I am cooking a meal.

<u>**Hu**</u> cxa‡ ?itkini kiki‡. = I will be preparing a meal.

Pikaks <u>hu</u> nu‡ ?itkini kiki‡. = I have already prepared a meal.

<u>Hun</u> ?upxni. = I know.

 $\underline{\mathbf{Hu}}$  qaki?ni ma? $\mathbf{g}$ . = I said don't.

Hun ?ini Ktunaxa. = I am Ktunaxa.

<u>Hun</u>?iyaku?ni ?akawut<del>l</del>a?nam. = I put up a tipi.

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We / all of us / all us people (more than one person, including the speaker).

"Hu" / "Hun" + naŧa is <u>used with a verb word</u> and is <u>often placed into the</u> middle of a verb.

#### **Examples:**

<u>Hun</u> ?in<u>naŧa</u>?ni Ktunaxa. = "We are Ktunaxa." Or "All of us are Ktunaxa."

Hun ?uma@naŧa?ni. = "All of us laughed." Or "We all

laughed."

Hin / Ninku = You (singular-one person)

Sometimes "Hin" and "Ninku" are used separately and sometimes they are used together.

### **Examples:**

Ninku, ?itkinin kiki‡. = "You, prepare a meal." (said like a

Command directly to one person.)

Ninku, hin cxa+ ?itkini kiki+. = "You, you will be preparing a meal."

Ninku, ka? kin ?aqaŧwiy? = "You, what do you think?"

<u>Hin</u> cxa‡ ?itkini kiki‡. = "You will prepare a meal."

## Ktunaxa Grammar Rules-Section #1: Showing a Subject

"kit" is used with a verb word and is put into the middle of a verb or used at the end of one.

### **Examples:**

?u<u>kiŧ</u> ģina<u>kiŧ</u> ?aġam. = All of you go to ?aġam. (command)

 $\dot{\mathbf{g}}$ ina $\mathbf{i}$ ?i $\cdot$ **ki\mathbf{i}**. = All of you, go eat. (command)

<u>Hin</u> ?in<u>kiŧ</u>ni\_\_\_\_\_. = You are \_\_\_\_\_.
